



DERON WILLIAMS 2005-2011





For years after John Stockton's retirement, the role of point guard seemed unfillable. That all changed in 2006 when the Utah Jazz selected ball-savvy PG Deron Williams with the 3rd overall pick in the 2005 NBA Draft. After taking over the starting spot in 2006, Deron formed a formidable partnership with Carlos Boozer and led the Utah Jazz to four straight playoff appearances. After 6 seasons with the Jazz, he finished with 4,003 assists, ranked 4th all-time in Jazz history.







2 COLLIN SEXTON






Born in Marietta, Georgia, Collin has stood out in all levels of basketball. In high school, Sexton was named a McDonald's All-American. He then played one year at University of Alabama and was named to the 2018 NCAA All-Tournament team before declaring for the NBA draft. He was drafted in 2018 as a first round pick to the Cavaliers. While playing for Cleveland, Sexton made it onto the All-Rookie second team. In 2022, Sexton came to play with the Jazz and recorded 20 points, 5 rebounds, and 2 assists in his debut game against the Denver Nuggets.









JOHN STOCKTON 1984-2003





When the Utah Jazz selected Gonzaga PG John Stockton with the 16th pick in the 1984 draft, they had no idea they were selecting who would arguably be the greatest PG to play the game. Together with Jazz legend Karl Malone, Stockton led the Jazz to 19 straight playoff appearances, including finals appearances in the 1996–97 and 1997–98 seasons. By the time Stockton ended his 19 year reign with the Utah Jazz, he accumulated an NBA best 15,806 assists and 3,265 steals, which are records that stand to this day. In addition to his NBA records, Stockton was named an NBA All–Star ten times.

JORDAN CLARKSON





Jordan Clarkson, aka "Flame Thrower", was drafted as a second round pick in 2014 and has continued to light up the league. He spent four seasons with the Los Angeles Lakers, during which time he made it on the All-Rookie first team. He then went on to play three seasons with the Cleveland Cavaliers, and after a trade in 2019, he started his career with the Utah Jazz. In 2021 he won the "Sixth Man of the Year" Award, showing his skill and dedication to the game. Clarkson has dual citizenship with the Philippines and the United States, he is the first Filipino-American to play for the Jazz, and represents the Philippines in international competitions.









ANDREI KIRILENKO 2001–2011





A former first-round pick, Kirilenko averaged 12.4 points, 5.5 rebounds, and 2.0 blocks per game over 10 years with the Jazz. He was named to the NBA's All-Defense team three times, while being chosen for the 2003-04 All-Star game. He's one of two players in league history to rank in the top-5 of both blocks and steals per game in a single season. His most famous game came when he recorded the rare 5×5 with 19 pts, 5 rebounds, 7 assists, 5 blocks, and 8 steals.










KARL MALONE 1985-2003



One of the greatest to ever play the game, the "Mailman" had one of the most decorated careers of anyone in the history of the NBA. He's a 2x MVP, 14x All-Star, 14x All-NBA, 4x All-Defense, and the team had his No. 32 retired. He's Utah's all-time leader in total points (36,928) and rebounds (14,968), ranking third and seventh, respectively, in NBA records. He played 18 years with the Jazz, teaming with John Stockton to be the greatest pick-and-roll duo of all time.







PETE MARAVICH 1974–1980





In small-town Aliquippa, Pennsylvania a young basketball player caught the eye of the nation with his unconventional, from-the-hip shooting method. That player grew up to be the legendary "Pistol" Pete Maravich. Besides having the best nickname in the game, Maravich became one of the most decorated players of his time, garnering five All-Star appearances, three All-NBA selections, and the NBA scoring title in 1977. His number hangs in the rafters of the Atlanta Hawks, New Orleans Pelicans, and the Utah Jazz.







23 LAURI MARKKANEN





Rightly known as "the Finnisher", Markkanen is a 7-foot Finland native who has made an impact at the collegiate, professional, and national level of basketball. Drafted as a first round pick in 2017, Markkanen played four seasons with the Chicago Bulls, making the All-Rookie first team in 2018. He moved to the Cleveland Cavaliers for one season in 2021, and then began his career for the Utah Jazz in 2022. He won Most Improved Player in 2023, and is the only player in NBA history with 100 dunks and 200 threes in a single season. Lauri is also the first NBA All-Star born in a Nordic country.







24 WALKER KESSLER






Walker Kessler, aka "Blocker" Kessler, is the towering 7-foot center from Atlanta, Georgia. Kessler, a promising rookie, played for the North Carolina Tar Heels before transferring to Auburn his Sophomore year in college. During the 2021–22 collegiate season, he was named the Naismith Defensive Player of the Year, the first Auburn player to receive that recognition. He was drafted 22nd overall in the 2022 NBA Draft to the Minnesota Timberwolves. Eight days later, he was traded to the Jazz. Walker has made a name for himself here in Utah, blocking 158 shots his rookie season. His shooting percentage, 0.720, was the second-best in NBA history for a player who shot at least 400 shots. He also made the All-Rookie first team, finished third in the Rookie of the Year poll, and made Team USA for the 2023 FIBA World Cup.

OCHAI AGBAJI






A Kansas City native, Ochai Agbaji attended the University of Kansas, where he won the 2022 National Men's Basketball Championship. He was one of the most decorated players at KU, winning the NCAA Final Four Most Outstanding Player, and Consensus All-America first team honors. This led to him being selected 14th overall in the 2022 NBA Draft to the Cleveland Cavaliers, and then traded a few months later being traded to the Jazz. His rookie season was just the beginning, highlighted by a career high of 28 points against the Denver Nuggets on April 8, 2023. Ochai is just getting started, and he is a part of the bright future for the Jazz!









JEFF HORNACEK 1994-2000



Jeff Hornacek played for the Utah Jazz from 1994–2000 and played a pivotal role in their back-to-back run to the NBA Finals in 1996–97 and 1997–98. After retiring in 2000, he returned to the Jazz as an assistant coach in 2011 and rejoined the Jazz coaching staff in 2022. His No. 14 is retired by the team.

MARK EATON 1982-1993






The NBA's all-time leader in blocks per game at 3.5, Eaton went from a fourth-round draft pick to one of the greatest defensive players to ever play the game. He spent all 11 seasons with the Jazz, winning the NBA's Defensive Player of the Year award in 1985 and 1989 and being named an All-Star in 1989. He was a 5x All-Defense selection and 4x blocks leader, and his No. 53 was retired by the Jazz.









ADRIAN DANTLEY 1979–1986






Although his time in Utah was short, Dantley made the most of it. Through seven years, he averaged 29.6 points (most in Utah history), 6.2 rebounds, and 3.6 assists per game, was a six-time All-Star, and was named to the All-NBA second team. His best run with the team came from 1981–84, averaging over 30 points per game. He was named to the Hall of Fame and is a two-time NBA scoring leader. His number, 4, is retired by the Jazz.

DARRELL GRIFFITH 1980–1991





Darrell Griffith, aka "Dr. Dunkenstein", averaged 20.6 points per game his first season with the Utah Jazz. Griffith was NBA Rookie of the Year in 1981, and made All-Rookie first team. During the 1983-84 season, he was part of the reason the Utah Jazz made it to their first playoffs ever, with his league-leading three-point shooting percentage of 36.1%. Shooting 91 three-pointers that season, he set the record for most threes made in a season. In the 1984-85 season, he broke his own record, with 92. In that same season, he became the leader for the most career three-pointers in the NBA. He spent his entire 10-year career with the Jazz and the Jazz retired his No. 35.









CARLOS BOOZER 2004-2010





Famous for his unmistakable "AND ONE!" shouts, Carlos Boozer made sure he was never forgotten on the court. Almost immediately after joining the team, Boozer became a perennial powerhouse for the Utah Jazz, averaging 19.3 points and 10.5 rebounds over his six seasons. In 2006–07 and 2007–08, the NBA awarded his dominant play with a spot on the NBA All–Star team. While Boozer's personal accomplishments speak for themselves, his greatest feats came in leading the Utah Jazz to 4 straight playoff appearances, including 2007, the last time the Jazz made the Western Conference Finals.
